Everyday Communication and Language Practice



Lots of talking and chat goes on when children are playing outside. Think about:

What opportunities are there for the children to communicate within the activity?

What vocabulary can we model?

How will you engage and re

spond to the children?

Bikes and Scooters

Children love riding around outside; however, it can be easy for children to do this without interacting with others. Try setting up 'stop off' points e.g. garage, shop, drive-through to encourage communication

Sensory Play

Try introducing a mud kitchen, sand, water, bubbles, shaving foam, or range of textures. These activities can be used to model lots of exciting vocabulary.

Open ended resources

Crates, boxes, fabric, pieces of wood, tubing, containers etc. Give children a chance to use their imaginations and be creative in their play.

Moving Water

Use tubes, piping, hoses, funnels, plastic cups, containers to move water around. Encourage children to work together to form a network of pipes/hoses. Ice with objects frozen inside are also great fun.

Linking with books

Place relevant books next to areas of learning to encourage children to explore them e.g. information books about seaside next to sand.

Imaginative Play

Role play, small world, treasure hunts
